

The convent of Letterkenny, in the county of Donegal, is being considerably enlarged from designs by Messrs. Hadfield and Goldie. The new apartments consist of chapel, school-rooms, and dormitory. A square tower terminates the facade, which is extremely simple, and consisted of stone of the locality.—*The Builder*.

A new convent has just been built at Omagh, from the designs of Messrs. Hadfield and Goldie, for the religious community some time settled there. The building, designed in a simple manner, contains numerous rooms, and is pleasantly situated near the station of the Londonderry and Enniskillen Railway. The contractor is Mr. Walter Doolin, of Dublin, and the cost of the building will be about 2,500*l*. It is to be opened on the 13th September.
