If it could, there nced not be the fretting and heart-burning which have so long disturbed our people in the attempt to procure the concession of claims which the very barest justice would have accorded long ago. But, for the present at all events, such a union would be foo millenial for the most sanguine to look forward to. What is true, however, of the whole, ought be true of its parts. If combined action, when it can be brought about. makes the whole representation of Ireland powerful in proportion to its compactness, that part of it which affects to give voice to the popular feeling ought augment its influence by a clear understanding as to the course it should take upon the questions where the co-operation of the entire body is not to be looked for.

MONUMENT TO THE LATE VERY REV. CANON WALSH, P.P.

WE are pleased to learn that a fitting memorial to this deeply regretted and most profoundly respected clergyman, has been erected in the Ovens Chanel, where his mortal remains repose.
