FATAL ACCIDENT.—The body of a labouring man residing at No. 4, White Lane, fell yesterday morning from a scaffolding in front of the establishment of Messrs Fox and Handlan, Dorset-street, and sustained fearful injuries on the head and body. He was at once conveyed to Richmond hospital. The sufferer, after lingering for some time, expired at five o'clock. An inquest will be held this day.

CHIEF OF ARSON.—Yesterday morning between twelve and one o'clock, the shop of Thomas Brown, to be known as the Coal-street, was discovered to be on fire by Sergeant Kelly, 16 A. The owner, not residing on the premises, the door had to be forced open by the police and a number of civilians, and succeeded in extinguishing the fire before any material damage had been done. Acting Inspectors Rice and Daly, of the division, and Sergeant McEvedy, of the division, inspected the premises, and found four distinct fires in the shop. The straw was composed of straw and match. It is stated only for the timely discovery of the fire by the police, in all probability a number of lives would have been sacrificed, as not less than thirty persons were asleep on the premises at the time the door was opened.
